


## **FVAP UPDATE DECEMBER 2023**







### FVAP'S 2022 REPORT TO CONGRESS PUBLISHED

After each federal general election, FVAP produces a required Report to Congress with data surrounding the experience of voters covered by the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA). In addition to voter registration and participation rates, the Report to Congress includes insights into the UOCAVA voting process and assistance provided to UOCAVA voters. These insights are compiled from FVAP's post-election surveys of active duty military members, overseas citizen voters, military voting assistance officers, and state election officials as well as other official sources.

#### The 2022 data showed:

- A voter registration rate for Active Duty Military (ADM) of 63 percent, a four-point increase over 2018.
- The voter participation rate for ADM of 23 percent, a three-point decrease from 2018.
- The estimated voter participation rate for all overseas citizens was 3.4 percent, which is lower than the estimated voter participation rate for the 2018 General Election (5.6 percent).
- ADM who received assistance from a DoD resource (e.g., FVAP, Unit Voting Assistance Officers, and Installation Voter Assistance Offices) were significantly more likely to submit an absentee ballot than ADM who did not receive such assistance for the sixth straight federal office election period.
- UOCAVA voters requested their ballots slightly later than they did in 2018, and general election ballots were returned later than in the 2018 and 2020 General Elections. Of recent election cycles, 2020 had the earliest ballot return timeframe.

#### TIPS: UOCAVA WEBSITE INFORMATION

FVAP's latest research note shows that simple improvements can enhance your State website's UOCAVA absentee voting information for use by voters. In most instances, voters can locate a state's UOCAVA information quickly though this information is more difficult to find in a few states. The research demonstrated that finding and understanding UOCAVA specific information was the most difficult of the tasks presented during the testing. To improve your website(s) usability for military and overseas voters, FVAP identified the following best practices:

- Implement search engine optimization strategies specific to UOCAVA information:
- 2. Make it easy to find UOCAVA information on election homepages and through menus;
- 3. Include all UOCAVA information on one page where possible;
- 4. Organize information by how a voter would go through the process;
- 5. Use lists or tables to organize information, especially dates and deadlines; and
- 6. Avoid election professional specific jargon and remove unnecessary content.
